Commentary

The Foundation Series Growth Fund slightly outperformed with its benchmark in June, returning 2.30% after fees and before tax.

Global equity markets delivered strong returns in the June quarter, shrugging off early volatility sparked by US trade policy shifts and Middle East tensions. The MSCI World Index rose +11.5% in USD terms, though a +7.4% NZD rally trimmed local returns to +3.8%. US equities led the charge, buoyed by robust corporate earnings – particularly in tech and optimism around the proposed One Big Beautiful Bill Act, a \$3 trillion tax reform package aimed at extending consumer tax cuts and incentivizing business investment.

While President Trump's sweeping tariffs initially rattled markets in April, a 90-day pause on higher reciprocal duties eased fears, allowing equities to rebound sharply. Geopolitical risks, including Israel-Iran clashes, briefly spiked oil prices but had little lasting impact, underscoring markets' resilience to headline-driven swings. Outside the US, returns were more muted but still positive. Japan outperformed, while Europe gained +3.3%, with Germany (+7.9%) benefiting from fiscal stimulus and corporate tax relief.

The S&P/NZX 50 posted a modest +2.7% return, trailing global peers amid lingering domestic headwinds. High interest rates continued to weigh on consumer demand and corporate earnings, though defensive sectors – like utilities and dividend-paying stocks – provided stability. The RBNZ's OCR cut to 3.25% in May and hints of further easing laid groundwork for recovery, but growth remains sluggish. Across the Tasman, Australia's S&P/ASX 200 surged +9.5%, rebounding from a weak Q1 as the RBA signalled deeper rate cuts and trade tensions eased. The divergence highlights NZ's reliance on a slower-moving domestic cycle, though improving sentiment and falling rates suggest brighter prospects may be ahead for Kiwi investors.

Fixed income markets were a bright spot, with NZ investment-grade corporates gaining +1.3% (up +7.5% annually). Global bonds benefited from shifting central bank policies: the Fed held rates but faces pressure from rising debt concerns (post-Moody's downgrade), while the ECB cut twice, lifting European debt. In NZ, with the OCR likely nearing its floor, yields stabilized, offering investors attractive income. However, the RBNZ's pause-and-hold approach suggests limited upside for bond prices from here.

The Fund's strategy is to provide a well-diversified portfolio targeting high long-run returns by reweighting back to the Fund's benchmark/target investment mix within a cost-effective and tax appropriate investment structure.
